Stuart Cryer

A former journalism and TV-media professor who now produces videos for social organizations. Using selected video segments he will discuss the inner dynamics of composing documentary videos.

Stuart Cryer was born and raised in Montreal, Quebec, where he

graduated with a Bachelor of Science degree from McGill University in 1971, concentrating in communications, studying under John Grierson, founder of the British Film Institute and the National Film Board of Canada. Between 1971 and 1979, Stuart worked at Document Films in Toronto, Loyalist College in Belleville, the University of British Columbia, and at Concordia University and McGill University in Montreal as a video and film producer and lecturer. Stuart became a professor of journalism, television production and workforce development at Cambrian College of Applied Arts and Technology in Sudbury in 1979 until his retirement in 2009. During his tenure, he was communications officer for the faculty union and active in the broader community, producing videos for social organizations including first nations, women's and environmental groups and unions. Productions have been aired to local audiences and over networks such as the CBC, CTV, TVO and CBS. Between 1986 and 1989, on sabbatical and leave from Cambrian College, Stuart worked as a video trainer for the African National Congress in the Department of Arts and Culture and the Department of Information and Publicity in Lusaka, Zambia. Stuart has given media production workshops in Vancouver, Winnipeg, Toronto and Montreal for the Canadian Association of Labour Media (CALM) and in





Nain, Labrador with the <u>OKâlaKatiget Society</u>. He continues to produce videos and photographs and has designed and edited two books and other media.
